TIDINGS FROM THE EAST

The succession of leadership in any organization is critical to the ongoing success of that organization. Masonry, throughout its existence, has passed from generation to generation the Working Tools which provide the foundation of our tenets. The youngest of our craft begin these lessons by way of their coach and gain additional light by progressing through the degrees, attending Lodge and participating in outside educational activities such as the School of Instruction, Grand Lodge Communications and Wilkerson College. The College, established through a joint venture between the Grand Lodge and the Scottish Rite, offers Deacons the chance to learn from those who have traveled this journey before them as well as from their peers who are

scattered all across this great State. By attending the school as a Deacon one has three years to prepare for his year as Master. I hope that the preparations and studies that I have made offer a rich, rewarding experience to the members of the Lodge this year. Again, I thank you for the honor and privilege of serving you as Master and look forward to the opportunities it will present.

No one should undertake such a journey without clear and identifiable objectives. For 2005 I have identified the following goals:

1) Masonic Education: We will see several educational presentations offered during the year. Worshipful Brother Rick Smith, Past DDGL from Pilot Mountain will present an insightful Bible Presentation. Brother

Rick has done extensive research on each of the U. S. Presidents and where they had their Bible open to at the time of inauguration. Illustrious Sir H. Lloyd Wilkerson will present the History of Freemasonry in the Military and Wo. Brother Ric Carter will speak on the historical Mural, which is painted in the Grand Lodge. Depending on ritual work, it is my intent to have at least one education session per month if possible. I am also looking into the possibility of a weekend trip to Washington, DC for a Masonic Weekend in the fall. This would be an event that can include your spouse or significant other and include the conferring of a 3rd Degree at the Geo. Washington Memorial. More on this later!

LODGE TO IMPLEMENT PHONE TREE SYSTEM

As a means of improving communications between the Lodge and its members, the membership approved the purchase of a Phone Tree system. This is a computerized system that will allow the Lodge to place as many as 60 calls per hour to update our members on the business of the Lodge. For

example a call could be made that would notify members of upcoming meetings, presentations or special events. Also should the need arise for an Emergent Communication the entire membership could be notified in a matter of minutes.

This system is not intended to be a disruption of your

evenings or family events. For those not wanting to participate you may "Opt Out" simple by letting us know. If the system receives an answering machine it will leave a message. For busy signals it will try to complete the call several times before terminating the call. Look for this system soon!

August 29, 5th Monday Night Dinner with OES Chapters;

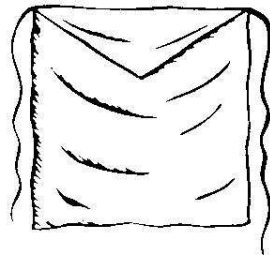
Sept. 23—24, Grand Lodge Communication in Raleigh;

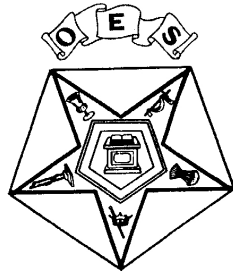

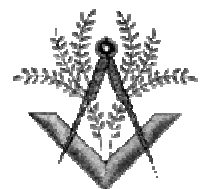

2) Improved Communication: As you have already witnessed by the layout and expanded Yearbook one of the major objectives this year is increased and improved communications between the Lodge and its members. Too often I hear complaints from Brothers that while hospitalized or home incapacitated they did not hear from anyone associated with the Lodge. Brothers, if we don't know about it we can't respond. I have already implemented a means of gathering updated contact information so we can stay in touch. Included in this year's budget is a computer system that will allow us to manage our database within the walls of the Lodge. No longer will any one member "own" the database or be responsible for its maintenance. At its February 21st meeting, the Lodge approved the purchase of a Phone Tree system that will notify all of our members within a matter of hours when an Emergent Communication is needed or if an emergency arises. This system will also notify members of upcoming events and will be made available to OES.

3) Outreach: The time has come when we must reach out and spread the word of Masonry to those who have not been so fortunate as you and I. Masons, not Hollywood or novels should teach the tenets of Masonry. Brothers, the biggest secret of Masonry is that there are no secrets in Masonry with the exception of a few words and signs. Masonry, its rich history and mission, should be discussed publicly. There is very little that cannot be said on the steps of the Courthouse any given day. It is really okay to admit in public that you are a Mason.

Be proud! Invite a friend, co-worker or family member to dine with us. Remember the closing charge, recommend it especially to the household of the faithful . . .

4) Family events: As Masons we all know that our families and our faith come before all else. It is my hope that we can have 2 or 3 family oriented events during the year where our families can join us. Through this they too can get to know one another and the bonds of friendship can form between our spouses and our children.

5) Officers will respond as a TEAM: A blind man could see the division that was present in our Lodge in December 2004. At a meeting of both the elected and appointed officers prior to the installation it was made clear my expectation that we would work as a group for the betterment of our Lodge. Our officers this year come from a diverse background but they also come with one common objective: To provide leadership and direction so that Cary Masonic Lodge No. 198 can continue its rich heritage and growth for centuries to come. At the conclusion of that meeting 100% of the participants reaffirmed their commitment to work together as a team. I am proud of them and honored to be among them.

6) Let's Have Some Fun: Finally Brethren lets have a little fun. I am as tired of redundant topics and meetings as you are. Lets take the opportunity to make the meetings enjoyable and worth coming too. Sure, we have some items of business that are mandated but they only take up a small portion of the meeting. If you have an idea for a discussion topic or event that you would

like to see let me know. The Officers are here to serve you, not dictate to you. This Lodge belongs to the members and its membership shall determine its course.

In reviewing the Yearbook you will see some revisions surrounding the Committee composition. While the Code mandates some Committees as well as its membership, most are at the discretion of the Master. I have taken the liberty of combining some Committees and eliminating others. If a Committee is going to function in name only, fail to meet or give reports then why have it. I hope by streamlining the process we will increase, not only participation, but productivity as well. Each of the Chairmen have committed to insuring that their Committee is meeting its mandate and that the Lodge is kept abreast of their progress.

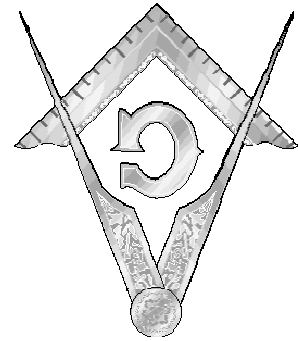

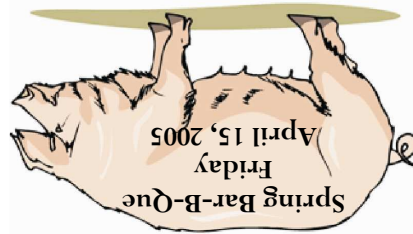

As in years past the 1st Degree Team will be lead by Senior Deacon Flynn Hudson; the 2nd Degree Team by Junior Warden Tommy Stephenson and the 3rd Degree Team by Senior Warden Gerald Edwards. They have been challenged to include as many different members as possible, especially new members. They are also encouraged not to utilize the same member for the same Chair two times unless absolutely necessary. This allows members to learn the various parts and put those teachings into practice. Not

sure you know the speaking part? Don't worry, we will teach it to you. Start out in a Steward's Chair and learn the floor action and then progress through the various stations, accepting more involved roles as you move up. Please contact us if you have a particular part you would like to try. I am sure some of the members who have done them repeatedly would welcome the opportunity to see greater involvement and try new Chairs as well.
